Designate a Site Coordinator

Who will serve as the central point of contact for the SAKI TTA Team; this individual should have the lead agency's full support. Together, the site coordinator and the lead agency will be responsible for fostering and coordinating communication among team members and ensuring that the team is meeting milestones.

The site coordinator must also:

- Demonstrate a willingness and <u>commitment to institutionalize systems</u>, <u>policies</u>, <u>and protocols</u> developed by the working group to help address the backlog of unsubmitted SAKs and prevent a future backlog.
- Be a strong and knowledgeable <u>leader</u> who can work closely with the lead agency to ensure a coordinated effort among all SAKI team members.
- Leverage their organization's skills to support the work.
- Foster solid working relationships and hold all entities accountable for their roles within the SAKI effort.
- The site coordinator does not need to be a sworn law enforcement officer; however, prior experience working with law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, and victim advocates will be highly advantageous.
